Breast Cancer Awareness Month



Since 1985, October has been a time for raising awareness of breast cancer. Originally a mere week long, the American Cancer Society event has grown into a full month, aiming to promote screening and prevention of the disease. Today, Breast Cancer Awareness Month is filled with campaigns and programs by a wide variety of groups, designed for supporting people diagnosed with breast cancer, educating people about breast cancer risk factors, stressing the importance of regular screening, and fundraising for breast cancer research. Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among American women, affecting 1 in 8 every year and 2.3 million women worldwide-and the largest risk factors are simply being a woman and growing older. Regular self-exams and screening are always recommended, as early detection may be more treatable. Within the month are even more specific events, including Metastatic Breast Cancer Awareness Day on October 13th, and Men's Breast Cancer Awareness Week from October 17 to 23rd. Nearly 3000 American men are expected to be diagnosed with breast cancer this year, with over 500 expected to die from the disease, but lack of awareness and stigma can prevent detection and care. As stated on the official website, "October can feel different for each of us-some wear pink to celebrate, some quietly observe the month, some feel grief, and some feel unseen or misunderstood. We want to normalize it all."

Ongoing Breast Cancer Research at Wood Hudson Cancer Research Lab

Scientists and students at Wood Hudson Cancer Research Laboratory study new ways to prevent, diagnose and treat breast cancer, using both models of cultured breast cancer cell lines grown in the laboratory and deidentified archived formalin fixed paraffin embedded surgical specimens of breast tumors. The results of our research are published in peer reviewed scientific journals and presented at local, national, and international scientific meetings. Students participating in the Wood Hudson Cancer Research Laboratory Undergraduate Research Education Program (UREP) will be presenting their research at the Kentucky Academy of Sciences (KAS) Annual Meeting to be held this year November 3rd and 4th at Northern Kentucky University.

Men Tran, who is an international student at Northern Kentucky University and a participant in UREP, will be reporting on her study of the role that oxidative stress regulatory genes play in breast cancer. She is studying both a triple negative breast cancer cell line and an estrogen receptor positive breast cancer cell line. Susan Sterling, a University of Cincinnati student and a UREP participant will report on changes in the biosynthesis of the amino acid serine that breast tissues undergo during malignant transformation.
